With over 2,000 more miles of shoreline than the East and Gulf coasts combined, the Dust Bowl in Oklahoma has long since drowned. In rolling rivers and clearwater streams, tumbling falls and sparkling lakes—our wide blue waters stretch for miles. It's an aquatic paradise that's home to every sort of water sport: swimming, sailing, boating, skiing, canoeing, windsurfing, scuba diving, even parasailing. And as

one of the nation's top three states for fresh-water fishing, Oklahoma's famous for everything from catfish, striped and crappie to bass, bluegill and trout.
