This is a letter from a group of leading citizens of Arkansas admonishing Stand Watie to use his influence as a prominent leader of the Cherokees and the other civilized tribes to arm themselves and join with Arkansas in the Confederate cause. Fayetteville, Arkansas May 9th 1861

The State of Arkansas will sever the bonds uniting her to the Federal Government, during this week. Earnestly solicitous for the safety, integrity and prosperity of our neighbors, the Cherokee People, and knowing their interests to be identical with ours and liable with ours to be assailed, we hereby extend to them, through you, a prominent citizen among them, our heart felt wishes for their welfare; and also hereby request them to act with us.

Our advice, diffidently propositioning them, is, to this effect; that they put themselves in a state of armed neutrality, prepared and on the guard; to commit no act of hostility against the Federal Gov't. and to maintain their rights as Southern People; but in the event of any attack upon their rights, or in case that the State of Arkansas is involved in war, which is the same thing, we cancely invite you to unite with us in defence against a common foe. Not presuming to dictate, nor desirous of intermeddling with the laws and rights of the Cherokees, we respectfully recommend you to prepare yourself, and your people by organizing companies of warriors to repel any invasion of your rights, as Cherokees or as Southern People.

A letter of assurance that we can render, or

that we can notify the State of Arkansas and the Confederate States to render the Cherokee and their neighbors the

Creeks and others, will be cheerfully accorded: And as

far as we are authorized or may speak for the State of Arkansas and the Southern States, we can

safely assure the Cherokee People, that their rights and immunities, shall in all regards, be respected and

carry out hostilities against the State of Arkansas, the Cherokees may know that their soil will be invaded,

wrested from them, settled by northern hordes and their
