

**100 Years of Oklahoma's Transportation Celebrated in Duncan** FOR IMMEDIATE RELEASE November 9, 2011 PR# 11-067

The Oklahoma Department of Transportation opened its doors to the public in Duncan on Wednesday, Nov. 9, to celebrate 100 years of transportation in our state. Hundreds of current and former employees of Division 7 joined citizens and dignitaries for an open house and to tour displays of equipment and historic memorabilia.

"This is our final stop for the open house celebrations across the state this year," ODOT Director of Engineering David Streb said. "We enjoy sharing these centennial events with so many and providing educational opportunities about our transportation system and programs."

Division 7 includes Caddo, Carter, Comanche, Cotton, Grady, Jefferson, Love, Murray and Stephens counties. This area has a long history of important transportation moments, including:

- In October 1924, a convict labor camp was established to assist in the difficult rock excavation needed to construct SH-4 across the Arbuckle Mountains in Murray and Carter counties.
- In April 1942, the first project to pave SH-49 between Cache and the Wichita Mountains Wildlife Refuge in Comanche County was awarded.
- In November 24, 1965, a project to build five bridges along I-35 in Love and Carter counties completed.
- In March 1985, a dedication ceremony was held at the Ft. Sill Reservation celebrating resuming rail service from Chickasha, through Anadarko, Fort Sill, to Wichita Falls, TX.

A comprehensive look at the origins of transportation in our state can be found in the new coffee table book, *ODOT100: Celebrating the First 100 Years of Transportation in Oklahoma*. This limited edition book traces the origins of transportation in our state, the challenges faced throughout the decades and the current accomplishments on topics such as interstates, bridges, waterways and rail. It also includes many compelling stories and historic photos.
