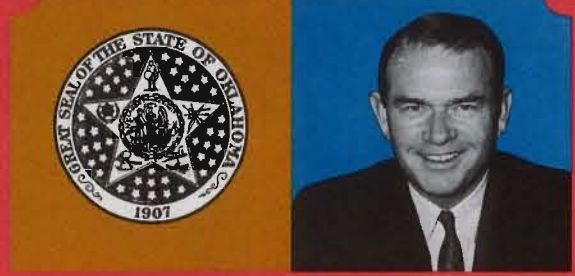

- OKLAHOMA'S vacation adventuresland**
1. **BLACK MESA** — Highest point in Oklahoma—4,876 feet—35 miles northwest Boise City.
 2. **DINOSAUR PIT** — Prehistoric beasts found here near in Shoal Museum, University of Oklahoma. Pit located 33 miles northwest Boise City.
 3. **BLACK MESA STATE PARK** — Fantastic formation eroded from lava. Trout fishing, picnic and camp grounds. 22 miles west and 10 north of Boise City.
 4. **SANTA FE TRAIL** — 1823-1866 — Traces visible 18 miles west, 4 north of Boise City.
 5. **FORT NICOLS** — Established 1855 by Kit Carson to guard Santa Fe Trail. Marker 15 miles west, 4 north Boise City. National Historic Landmark.
 6. **NO MAN'S LAND MUSEUM** — Remics of early days in Oklahoma. Prehistoric. Located at Goodwell, 11 miles south of Lawton.
 7. **FIRST CHURCH IN NO MAN'S LAND** — Building still used by United Presbyterian Church in Beaver. Located in or WESTERN CATTLE TRAIL — 1874-1880. Thousands of cattle traveled the trail from Texas to the Dodge City railroad. Jackson County in Harper County S.H. 34 follows approximate route.
 8. **FORT SUPPLY** — Established 1868. Was supply base for Carter's 7th Cavalry. Buildings now part of Western State Hospital. 15 miles northwest of Woodward.
 9. **SOUNDING SPRINGS STATE PARK** — Big timber fed by springs bubbling up through white sand. Camp site and picnic area. Cabins. One mile north and 4 east of Woodward.
 10. **ALABASTER CAVERNS STATE PARK** — Underground world of varicolored pure alabaster. Natural bridge, picnic and camping areas. 10 miles east and 18 north of Woodward.
 11. **CHIMNEY ROCK** — One of several strange rock formations in Capitan River Valley. 10 miles east, 18 north, 15 east of Woodward.
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 14. **BATTLE OF THE WASHITA** — Site of Washita valley destroyed by General Custer and troopers on Nov. 27, 1868. Remains of the Little Big Horn. Overlook of Custer. One mile west of Cheyenne.
 15. **BLACK KETTLE MUSEUM** — Artifacts of battle of the Washita and old Cheyenne country. Cheyenne.
 16. **SANDSTONE CREEK PROJECT** — First upstream flood prevention and soil conservation project 100 per cent completed in world. Seven miles south of Cheyenne.
 17. **FLOSS LAKE RECREATION AREA** — Fishing and water sports on Floss Lake. 14 miles west of Cheyenne.
 18. **AMISH COLONY** — Well kept farms of Amish sect. 14 miles east, nine north Clinton.
 19. **BEE CITY** — Honey farm. 15 miles west, 5 east, 18 north, 15 east of Woodward.
 20. **COMMERCIAL SALT PLANT** — Bore pumped from deep wells. Six miles west of Sapulpa.
 21. **QUARTZ MOUNTAIN STATE PARK** — Surrounds Lake Atlas. Modern lodge and cabins. Water sports, camping and picnic areas. Sand beaches. 15 miles northeast of Mangum or 30 miles south-west of Hobart.
 22. **ALVIN KILL FORCE BASE** — SAC base, center of Alvin Killebrew complex. Atlas.
 23. **HELICOPTER PLANT** — Plant of old oil ad make commercial helicopters. Fredrick.
 24. **LITTLE SAHARA STATE RECREATION AREA** — Sand dunes. Camping and picnic areas. 12 miles west, 17 south of Alva.
 25. **GREAT SALT PLAINS** — Observation tower overlooking dunes three miles east of Cherokee.
 26. **U.S. WILDLIFE REFUGE** — On Great Salt Plains — More than 250 varieties of birds. Huge flocks of geese and ducks. Three miles north and 6 east of Cherokee.
 27. **ROMAN NOSE STATE PARK** — Spring-fed gypsum canyon. Modern lodge and cabins. Camp and picnic grounds. Five miles north of Wetmore.
 28. **AMERICAN HORSE CANYON** — Gypsum canyon — new WISDOT Department Lake and area. 15 miles north, 14 west of Wetmore.
 29. **ESSEX CHOKOMA REFUGE** — This famous trail shows died in 1928 at Left Hand Spring and was burned there. Marker at site. 11 south Deerfield, 5 northeast of Wetmore.
 30. **ZINK SMELTER** — One of largest in United States. Deerfield.
 31. **HENNESSEY MASSACRE** — Site where wagon train led by Pat Hennessey was massacred by hostile Indians or outlaws. Grave on research site. Hennessey, 19 miles north of Kingfisher.
 32. **OKLAHOMA STATE UNIVERSITY** — Bleed of old and new campus. Student Union is show place. Stillwater.
 33. **WISDOT CONVENTORY BUILDING** — Largest in United States — oil part was used by first state legislator when Guthrie was Oklahoma capital. Guthrie.
 34. **FIRST STATE CAPITAL** — Territorial capital and first state capital of Oklahoma. Site of writing, Oklahoma Constitution. Guthrie.
 35. **OKLAHOMA STATE GAME FARM** — On site of old Guthrie in world. Three miles north, 3 west from El Reno.
 36. **FEDERAL AVIATION AGENCY AERONAUTICAL CENTER** — School for FAR employees, home of fleet that check navigational aids over United States. Oklahoma City.
 37. **CLINTON-SHERMAN AIR FORCE BASE** — SAC base named with B-29 Bombers. Eight miles west, 4 north of Corral.
 38. **LITTLE RIVER STATE PARK** — on new Little River Reservoir. Camping and picnic areas. 12 miles east of Norman. Open Summer 1965.
 39. **ROMAN HILL OF FAME** — Remics of famous American Indians of all Tribes. Andarko.
 40. **WATERMELON FESTIVAL** — Harvest festival of Chickasha. Park Springs. 19 miles south of Chickasha.
 41. **SOUTHERN PLAINS INDIAN MUSEUM AND CRAFT CENTER** — Artifacts of Plains Indians. Curise made in craft shop. Andarko.
 42. **INDIAN CITY, U.S.A.** — Collection of authentic Indian housing used before coming of whites to Oklahoma. Dance, circus, museum. Two miles south Andarko.
 43. **PLATT NATIONAL PARK** — Area of cold springs used by Indians for healing. Sulphur.
 44. **WICHITA MOUNTAIN WILDLIFE REFUGE** — More than 1,000 buffalo, also Laughing Cattle, Elk, Deer and other game animals in rugged mountain setting. Six miles north and 4 west of Lawton.
 45. **TUXEER TOWER** — Overlook building on Lake Murray housing a geological museum. In Lake Murray State Park, seven miles south of Andarko.
 46. **WOLFGANG MUSEUM** — Tells history of man in United States from prehistoric to now. 13 miles southwest of Bartlesville.
 47. **COSSA WELLS STATE PARK** — Rugged wooded hills with clear stream and small lake. Cabins, camping and picnic areas. 15 miles northeast of Andarko.
 48. **OKLAHOMA'S FIRST COMMERCIAL OIL WELL** — Site of first commercial producer. Bartlesville.
 49. **WILL ROGERS STATE RECREATION AREA** — On Goshute Reservoir. Camp and picnic areas. Birthplace of Will Rogers. 18 miles north of Claremore.
 50. **OIL CAPITAL OF THE WORLD** — known far and wide as headquarters of oil. Tulsa.
 51. **GLITCHER MUSEUM** — Excellent collection of western and Indian art and artifacts. Tulsa.
 52. **KEYSTONE STATE PARK** — Development being done on new Keystone Reservoir on the Arkansas and Cimarron Rivers. 15 miles west, three north of Tulsa.
 53. **WILL ROGERS MEMORIAL** — Museum of Will Rogers's belongings. Tomb of famed Oklahoma humorist philanthropist and wife. Claremore.
 54. **DAVIS GUN COLLECTION** — Largest privately owned gun collection in U.S. Claremore.
 55. **PHIBROX ART CENTER** — Outstanding art exhibits. Annual oil Indian show. Tulsa.
 56. **ROSS GARDENS** — Outstanding rose gardens in southwest Tulsa.
 57. **HEYBURN LAKE RECREATION AREA** — Fishing, Camp and picnic areas. 11 miles west of Sapulpa.
 58. **POTTERY PLANT** — Largest pottery plant in Oklahoma. Sapulpa.
 59. **OKLAHOMA STATE TECH** — Largest state operated technical school in southwest Oklahoma.
 60. **LAKE OKMULGEE STATE RECREATION AREA** — Fishing and boating. Camp and picnic areas. Five miles west of Oklahoma City.
 61. **CRENSHAW INDIAN CAPITO** — Built in 1878. Houses Creek Indian Museum. National Historic Landmark. Chickasha.
 62. **FOUNTAINHEAD STATE PARK** — On new lake

63. **CHICKASAW INDIAN CAPITO** — Erected in 1897 by the Chickasaw Indian Nation. Building in use as Johnson County Court House. Tahlequah.
64. **MAGNOLIA TREES** — hundreds of Magnolia trees on campus of Southeastern State College and throughout city. Durant.
65. **CHICKASAW INDIAN CAPITO** — Erected 1927. Now used as Cherokee County Court House. Tahlequah.
66. **LAKE TEXOMA STATE PARK** — On America's most popular man-made lake. Modern lodge and cabins. Camp and picnic areas. 12 miles east of Madill.
67. **LEAD AND ZINC MINES** — 10 State area. Historic mine to public. 12 miles northeast of Miami.
68. **TWIN BRIDGES STATE RECREATION AREA** — At head of Grand Lake of the Cherokees. Camp and picnic areas. Five miles east and 8 south of Miami.
69. **CLASSY HOUSE RESTAURANT** — Unusual structure attracts Will Rogers Tourists at midway point.
70. **HONEY CREEK RECREATION AREA** — Point into Grand Lake of the Cherokees. Camp and picnic areas. 17 miles north, 2 west of Lawton.
71. **OSAGE LAKE OF THE CHEYENNES** — Oklahoma's most developed resort lake with more than 100 private resorts ranging to 1,300 mile shoreline. 25 miles east of Lawton, eight miles southeast Miami, or 10 miles north of Jay.
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
