



100 Years of Oklahoma's Transportation Celebrated in Ada

The Oklahoma Department of Transportation opened its doors to the public in Ada on Friday, Oct. 28, to celebrate 100 years of transportation in our state. Hundreds of current and former employees of Division 3 joined citizens and dignitaries for an open house and to tour displays of equipment and historic memorabilia.

"As part of our centennial celebrations, we are showing our appreciation for the public's support of a better transportation system," ODOT Chief Engineer Gary Evans said. "We are hosting open houses across the state this year to share the story of 100 years of transportation, and to provide educational opportunities about our programs."

Division 3 includes Cleveland, Coal, Garvin, Hughes, Johnston, Lincoln, McClain, Pontotoc, Pottawatomie, Okfuskee and Seminole counties. This area has a long history of important transportation moments, including:

- In October 1924 a federal aid project to construct a section of gravel surfaced road from Weleetka and extending north seven miles in Okfuskee County was completed.
- In September 1934, the project to construct three bridges on SH-56 in Seminole County was completed. The entire project cost \$40,874.46.
- In October 1941, construction began on the SH-18 bridge over the North Canadian River south of Shawnee.
- In August 1971, the Transportation Commission began discussing the need for improvements to I-35 from I-40 south through Norman because of growing traffic needs.

A comprehensive look at the origins of transportation in our state can be found in the new coffee table book, ODOT100: Celebrating the First 100 Years of Transportation in Oklahoma. This limited edition book traces the origins of transportation in our state, the challenges faced throughout the decades and the current accomplishments on topics such as interstates, bridges, waterways and rail. It also includes many compelling stories and historic photos.
